
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If You Ever Want To Bring An Alligator To School, Don't!

The illustrations are hilarious. The little details are great, like a boy who drops his shiny rocks on the floor to start a one-man standing ovation. The facial expressions and body language on all the characters are a great part of the narrative. The way Magnolia tells her story - not really admitting to having firsthand experience; just warning everyone else in case they're ever in this situation - a great choice. Most importantly, my 3-year-old daughter loves it. She is so excited because she already knows what's coming on the next page. And (you'll understand why if you get the book) she has been randomly shouting, "BOOGA BOOGA BOOGA!" without warning.

By now, of course, youâ TMII wish youâ TMd brought a hollow stick or a birdâ TMs nest or some sparkly rocks for show-and-tell instead of an alligator. By now, youâ TMd rather have some dirt than an alligator. IF YOU EVER WANT TO BRING AN ALLIGATOR TO SCHOOL, DONâ TMT!Magnolia and her alligator never get old.
